GOD IS IN THE DETAILS AT THE VIRGEN DE SAN JUAN DEL VALLE SHRINE in San Juan, Texas

About 5 miles from the border of Mexico in the verdant Rio Grande Valley is the Basilica of Our Lady of San Juan del Valle. Averaging more than one million pilgrims a year – as many as 20,000 a weekend – the national shrine dedicated to Our Lady of San Juan del Valle is one of the most visited shrines in the United States. They come from every state in the Union and from many foreign countries to find masses, in both Spanish and English, in progress from early morning to late at night.


After the original Shrine was rebuilt in the 1970s, Rohn and Associates Design, Inc. was commissioned to design and fabricate life-size exterior Stations of the Cross, the huge 40' x 30' exterior mosaic of Our Lady, and to develop the landscape that wraps around the mile-long Way of the Cross. The Stations lead pilgrims to return to Christ's loving presence through the Sacrament of Reconciliation. The twenty-four life-size bronze images are placed along a bucolic path surrounding the outside of the Shrine, allowing for a place of meditation and spiritual reflection.

The labor intensive project was well-worth the end result: evocative and life-like figures depicting the Passion, allowing worshippers to truly identify with Christ's sacrifice and his final hours.



Mini Wood Model


Rolf Rohn and his staff worked closely with a master wood carver and foundry in Ortesei and Lake Como, Italy, to custom-fabricate these bronzes and a heavy oak cross. They first designed and created small-scale models, and once those were approved, actual size wood carvings were made. From these carvings, casting models were fashioned and then the final bronze casts were done. Both the wood models and the bronze statues were sent to Texas via ship in large crates. Once at the Shrine, the administrator enlisted local contractors to install the Stations with cranes while Rolf oversaw the work to ensure that they were according to the Master Plan.







Jesus Falls Full Size Statue


The mile-plus long path along which the Stations were placed was fashioned from rocks brought in via train and then truck from Austin because there were no large stones native to the area. The company also developed exterior lighting to appropriately illuminate the path and the Stations, which are accessible day or night to those who wish to visit. Comfortable benches, signage, water sprinklers and water fountains were strategically placed along the way so that one can stop, rest and reflect. The labor intensive project was well-worth the end result: evocative and life-like figures depicting the Passion, allowing worshippers to truly identify with Christ's sacrifice and his final hours.


Kathy Maglicco, of Rohn and Associates Design, Inc., recalls one particularly poignant moment when she was visiting the Shrine early one morning: "I noticed an elderly grandmother...standing in front of the 12th station with her hand on the feet of Christ, praying...while parents were walking with their children through the Stations, explaining to them Christ's sacrifice for us. It is quite a remarkable experience to physically encounter these images...walk up to them, touch them, connect with them, feel them." She attributes this ability to identify with these life-size figures as having brought a huge influx of pilgrims to the Shrine to serve as a renewal of faith. It is now a peaceful place of prayer where Heaven and earth meet to elevate our spirit to God.

After all, she's done just that—accepted, tackled and overcome challenges—over the course of the past 16 years while progressing through a long list of titles, positions and professional duties that evolved into the position she's held since 2009: director of properties for the Diocese of Colorado Springs. Keep in mind that *progressed* means accumulating and continuing the duties involved in each challenge, while tackling the next. She didn't forgo any previous or current duties along this professional journey, but, like many professionals today, simply added them like railcars to a locomotive.

In addition to the outlook and attitude it takes—optimism, determination and enthusiasm—Janis has found herself fairly well-prepared for each of these challenges through not just

her formal education, but sometimes curiously and coincidentally experienced life skills, exposures and happenstance events. Throughout her childhood in Oklahoma, she witnessed what it takes to build a successful commercial construction contractor through her father who hoped that Janis would someday be an architect or engineer. With her father's hope in mind, she first studied architectural engineering at Oklahoma State University, followed by a transfer to a nearby university to pursue design drafting and computer science. Without a true passion for careers in those areas, Janis married college sweetheart Brad Balentine and the two agreed it was time they "got out of Oklahoma and experienced life," she says.

"My husband (a computer programming major) joined the Air Force, which took us a variety of places including San Antonio, Mississippi, Hampton, Virginia and, eventually, Omaha," Janis says. Throughout that time, Janis worked in the banking, insurance, leasing and personal financial management fields—all of which provided new areas of groundwork experience for her future duties with the Colorado Springs Diocese.

"I finished my bachelor's degree at University of Nebraska in Omaha in business administration with specialties in finance and management information systems. Business is what I had wanted all along—it was what I was most interested in—not the areas I studied right out of high school," she continues.

Shortly after Janis completed her degree in 1994, the Balentines accepted a transfer to Schriever Air Force Base in Colorado Springs where the couple has remained, declaring Colorado their home. Janis began her tenure with the Diocese of Colorado Springs in 1997 as secretary to the finance officer—and the progression began. Recognizing her abilities and talents, the diocese soon added the roles of contract administrator, office manager and plant manager to Janis' responsibilities and changed her title to facility

manager. It was about this time that a letter describing CCFM and inviting diocesan personnel to consider membership crossed Janis' desk. "I convinced my boss it would be good for the diocese and would facilitate my movement from finance to facility, property and construction management," she says.

Janis recalls her first CCFM conference in Palm Springs with great fondness and gratitude for the welcome she received and the years of support, guidance, education and camaraderie the organization has provided. "I remember I sat by Lou Baird (CCFM's first president) on the tours. He was so welcoming...he kind of took me—this neophyte girl—under his wing. All those guys: Lou (Baird), Joe (Gallano), Doug (Cissel), Walt (Wostenberg) and Greg (Veith)...they are the ones that made me know that CCFM is here for us to be of help to each other. I knew I could call on any of those guys," Janis says.

"It is part of me—a real part of my heart. We talk through things, we make good friends. These are good people serving a good institution. Our first priority is taking care of the people of God." Janis says.

In her oversight and management of the facilities included in the 42-parish/mission diocese, Janis deals with 150-year-old parishes in the mountains and eastern Great Plains as well as new construction within the 15,493-square-mile boundaries that claim a 15 percent Catholic population. Half of the 42 parishes are in the metro Colorado Springs area where the population has nearly doubled in the past two decades, but many mission parishes in outlying areas must share resources, buildings and priests, she explains.

While she may not actually have said she loves a challenge, what Janis DID say is that she loves her job and the people with whom she works. She also enjoys the Colorado lifestyle where things are larger than life, yet at the same time calming in a peaceful, majestic sort of way. That's where she's found that she works best in discovering God's gifts—both within and around her—and developing and using the talents and gifts He places in life's pathways.

Janis has found CCFM to be a professional gift, valuable almost beyond measure. Since joining the organization in 1999, she has given back in gratitude by serving on the board of directors in positions including secretary, treasurer and president as well as membership and nominating chairs. "I think everyone should serve on the board in order to truly understand what goes into it and what it takes the run the conference," she says. She currently serves on four committees, has attended CCFM conferences in 12 cities and feels that "as members of a Catholic organization, we understand each other. CCFM is just as important to belong to as the big international organization," she continues.
